
Course Description

This is a 3 credit hours course. In this course, you will take a multicultural lens and learn to apply that to different aspects of psychology. You will learn about what culture is and how it can impact what we know about human mind and behavior. Therefore, the central question we will ask throughout the semester is: Is what we know about people's thought processes and behavior from this research applicable to human beings around the world? The goal of this course is to cultivate multicultural competence among students, allow them to reflect on their own cultural experiences and worldview, and develop critical thinking skills in a multicultural context. Different class activities and assignments are designed to achieve such goals.

Course Learning Outcomes

- Define culture and explain how culture relates to the study of psychology
- Evaluate major psychological theories and research from a cross-cultural perspective
- Explain the effects of culture on aspects of psychology and human development
- Critically reflect on how your own cultural experiences impact your worldview, communication style, etc.
- Apply knowledge about other people's diverse experiences to personal perspectives and decisions (critical consciousness)
- Practice oral presentation skills and/or writing in APA style

Course Requirements

Pre-/Post-Class Survey (10%)

You will complete a brief class survey at the beginning (5%) and towards the end (5%) of the course to set up your goals and reflect on your achievements.

Discussion Posts (20%)

You will complete two online discussion posts (10% each) in D2L to reflect on how cultural experiences shapes your beliefs and behaviors. Please make sure you follow the instructions carefully for each discussion.

Response Papers (30%)

You will write two response papers (15% each) to provide summaries and critiques to an empirical research article in cross-cultural psychology.

Cultural Observation Project (20%)

You will pair up to design and conduct a mini-cultural observation project to observe a cultural behavior in a natural setting of your choice. You will record the observation results and report the findings in your project paper following APA-format.

Class Attendance & Participation (20%)

You are expected to think actively and participate in all class activities. Attendance will be checked throughout the course.

Evaluation and Grading Policies
